Alexander's Invasion

Alexander – son of King Philip of Macedonia – was born in 356 B.C. He died at the early age of 33. He was a ruthless imperialist who successfully expanded his empire across Asia. Yet, with all the bloodshed he caused, Alexander was also sensitive to art, culture, and philosophy.

In the year 326 B.C. this ambitious Greek conqueror entered India with a mighty army. Little by little he brought many kingdoms of North India under his sway. He is said to have invaded India with over three hundred thousand soldiers.

There is a famous story relating to Alexander's encounter with a defeated Indian prince by the name of Puru. This proud and valiant prince, having lost thousands of horses and elephants and men in battle, finally conceded victory to the invader. He was now brought before Alexander and asked how he wished to be treated. To which Puru is said to have replied in a fearless voice: "Treat me like a king!" The astounded Greek was much impressed with this answer, and he gave Puru his well-deserved respect.

Alexander had intended to make most of North India a part of his growing empire. But this did not come to pass. One reason for this was his premature death. However, Alexander's invasion opened up the doors of India to Greek influence, at least in some fields. In particular, Indian art was considerably affected by this contact, as also astronomy.
