Our family embraced the idea of the formation of ICA and the valuable role of an organization like ICA for ourselves, our children, and the community. In this forum, we were able to share with the community, our unique Indian heritage in the cultural, culinary, intellectual, and social realms. I reflect and reminisce about the opportunity we had, for the last thirty years, in belonging to this extended ICA family.

Ambar and I have been part of multiple ICA committees where we served in various roles. Despite ICA's limited financial resources, we believed in showcasing renowned Indian maestros for our community. Grants were written and we walked door to door for sponsorships from our business contacts. This was well before social media became part of our daily lives! We posted fliers all over town to spread the word and emailed neighboring communities to build our audience. Over the years, ICA committees were able to organize highly acclaimed programs by many Indian maestros like Late Pandit Birju Maharaj, Late Pandit Hariprasad Chaurasia, Pandit Zakir Hussain, beautiful dance performances by Nrityagram, Mamata Shankar and troupe, a magical solo Bharatanatyam performance by Ms. Alarmel Valli and so much more. A proud moment for our family was when my daughter Ujjaini accompanied Late Pandit Hariprasad Chaurasia on the tanpura. We also hosted some fabulous talent grown right here in the USA. During my tenure as the ICA Secretary, we hosted the impressive band Karyshma. The members of the band were students at MIT and Harvard. A March concert was scheduled. Mother nature threw in a curve ball, as she often does here in Iowa, with a severe snowstorm! Fortunately, the storm subsided, the artists arrived as scheduled, and it was a rocking concert with almost 200 people in the Ames City Hall auditorium.

The Talent Night provided us with a stage to showcase our very own members' – both adults and children - talents. We proudly prepared and presented many group song programs, multilingual as well as thematic compositions like 'Mile Sur Mera Tumhara' and 'Meghdoot' with poetry and prose readings, and background with relevant slides. Our children, Ujjaini and Dipayan, danced, played popular Bollywood songs on the violin, and participated in plays during Talent nights with their friends. The all-men skit "The Tiger and the Brahmin" and the murder-mystery play "Sorry Wrong Number" directed by Ambar resonated with our audience.

As a Sanskriti coordinator, I got to know and work with our amazing children. We had the age spread from 5 years to high school-age kids. We read stories, invited ISU students to talk about our cultural diversity and heritage, demonstrated and taught kids to tie the turban, and so on. Our children worked on a serious book project, "The Glimpses of India". The topics covered were: History, Geography, Art & Architecture, Music and Dance, and Poetry & Literature. Each team had a high school student as the team leader. We had two volumes with writings and illustrations by the children, an impressive outcome. At the end of the project, we celebrated an event where the children presented their work to their parents. The Ramayana play performance directed by Professor Krishna Vedula was also a highlight during our tenure in Sanskriti. From stage decoration, costumes, drawing, and coloring monkey masks, to make-up, it was a project where the adults and kids participated with gusto.

We have the privilege of having granddaughter Launa a part of the ICA community. Launa attended Sanskriti, enjoyed stories, filled Christmas goodie bags for donation, sang, danced, and played the violin with her friends in the Talent Nights. Launa says "Sanskriti was a fun and knowledgeable experience. I enjoyed learning about India. The dances were so fun, a very good experience". We look forward to the continuing evolution of ICA under the next generation. Cheers and our best wishes for the next thirty years!


A Magical Journey By: Parvati Ajay - 3rd Grade

Thanks to Discover Ames for hosting ICA along with other local non-profit organizations, at their First Look Reveal party! It was an astonishing event. We loved being part of it.




